## **IMPORTANT GARDENING TIPS FOR NOVEMBER**

## Give your garden a fresh start by finishing the season well

With winter continuing to progress across the region, November is the perfect time to get some last-minute tasks completed. These tips will help you get ahead of the curve and flourishing in spring:

## Before the freeze

Before the temperatures permanently dip below zero, here are few things to keep in mind:

- Water evergreens until the ground freezes to ensure there is moisture in the soil when winter arrives
- Aerate your lawn while there is still time, to improve its resiliency during the cold winter months
- Coil up garden hoses before they freeze to make them easier to store. Make sure you shut off and drain outdoor faucets and blow out irrigation.

## Protective measures

• Burlap screens are needed to protect any new or young plants from winter wind.

- Apply mulch to flower beds after pruning and removing the spent flowers and leaves that have been damaged by the frost. Keep mulch several inches back from trunks of trees to prevent rodents from gnawing at the bark.
- Put bricks or wood blocks under outdoor pots to prevent freezing to the ground or plant roots from freezing. You can also insulate the outside with bubble wrap to protect the container from frost.
- Root vegetables such as carrots and turnips can stay in the ground outdoors. Protect them by burying them with leaves or straw.

## Clean up

- Clean all rotted or fallen fruit and vegetables from the ground.
- Keep your lawn clear of leaves and debris. This will keep any fungus from spreading and prevent pests from making a home. Cut it to higher height than normal for the winter.
- Clean house gutters of leaves and dirt to ensure proper drainage through the winter.
